Shay's Sharing...

When I first started on my path to ministry, I began working in a small UU fellowship in rural, northern California. They had had a rough past and had too often been told No! I promised myself that I would say Yes as often as I could with them, and began rebuilding the groundwork for a congregational culture of hope and possibility.

Over the years of ministerial training and work, I've had to learn how to balance my desire to always say Yes! with the needs of my family and my mental and physical health – I've had to learn again how to say No.

Many of you have expressed concern about burnout and fatigue, and these are valid concerns given the history of ministerial expectations. But I promise you, I have learned my lesson well and am confident in my ability to set limits and maintain boundaries. I'm pretty good at saying No when I need to (and my partner Diana is even better at reminding me!). However, our society, especially in these days of fear-mongering, has become much too comfortable with an instant and unwavering No in response to so many things. It makes me again want to promise myself that I will, as often as possible, answer with a Yes instead.

I've organized the year into a series of themes, giving all of us a chance for a deeper dive into certain ideas and more time to look at concepts from different angles. We'll begin with "The Journey," exploring this new path we are walking together. What I'm hoping is that we can set aside some of our fears and anxieties, knowing that this beloved community is strong enough to hold them, and have the courage to say Yes more often than not as we figure out where we're going.

I'm reading a great book called *The Answer to How is Yes* by author and trainer Peter Brock. The basic premise is that we can so very often, both as individuals and as institutions, get stuck in the How questions, spinning our wheels as we dig ourselves further and further into the pit of how much will it cost? and who will we upset? and what if it doesn't work? Instead, Brock says, we need to "understand that the task is to shift the demand for the right answer to the search for the right question." We need to "raise the question of what do we want to create together?"

And then we do it.

And deal with all the how's and what if's as we go. Maintain space and time for heartfelt conversations that discuss and affirm doubts, feelings, and intuitions.

At our beginning of the year retreat, the Boards of the two churches and I explored some ideas of a new "culture" we want to encourage and inspire at both SUUC and UUCSB. A culture of making decisions based on our values and convictions. A culture of spiritual depth and maturity in all that we do. A culture of saying Yes! without letting ourselves get stuck in the fear and grief that always accompany change.

Now, I'm not saying that fear and grief aren't perfectly valid and real and reasonable responses to taking steps in new directions. And it will be important that our churches are places where it is safe to have and express these feelings. And, together we can move through them, continuing our journey, allowing curiosity and compassion be our guides as we search and search anew for where our hearts are leading us.

I've organized the year into a series of themes, giving all of us a chance for a deeper dive into certain ideas and more time to look at concepts from different angles.

I guess what I'm really saying is, in the words of Joseph Campbell, "The big question is whether you are going to be able to say a hearty YES to your adventure."

Thoughts From the President





The Ministerial Presence in our Church

Our wonderfully dedicated church historian, Helen Kane, is assembling a new edition of our Centennial history. She has asked me to fill in as acting minister, in order to write a piece on the ministerial presence in our church.

After a two-year intense ministerial search conducted with our sister church, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Saco/Biddeford, on May 6, 2018, we invited Reverend Shay MacKay to be our settled minister. She begins with SUUC and UUCSB on August 1, 2018. We have bid farewell to our 2-year interim minister, Reverend Stephen Cook.

To my count, we have had 14 full time ministers and 4 interim ministers from 1909-2018. Shay will be our 15th.

Personally, I have had the privilege of knowing and being informed and moved by 2 of these settled ministers, Reverend Paul Boothby and Reverend Sue Gabrielson and 2 interim ministers, Reverend Jenny Justice and Reverend Stephen Cook. And I cannot forget our wonderfully unique and blessed minister emeritus, Maurice Cobb. Each of them has, in his or her own way, left an imprint on my way of being in the world. And each of them has made it possible for me to embrace and adhere to and believe in the principles of this faith. I proudly affirm that I am a Unitarian Universalist!

I was brought up Christian, in the Congregational Church. I tried to accept the total Christian rhetoric, but ever since I was young, something was missing. I tried visiting different denominational churches, but nothing seemed to fulfill what I was looking for. I wasn't even sure what it was. I felt the need to be in a community that would accept me as an individual who could question. That is, until I walked into a UU Church. I have been coming to SUUC for nearly 20 years, and signed the membership book in 2002 after falling in love with Unitarian Universalism in general, and the SUUC congregation in particular.

I was ordained as a chaplain/minister in 2006 by the Chaplaincy Institute of Maine (fondly known as, ChIME). ChIME is an Interfaith ministry program that respects all spiritual paths including "no path" and honors Divine wisdom in all faiths.

Shortly after I was ordained, SUUC, under the leadership of Reverend Sue Kingman, minister from 2003 - 2015, created a group of Worship Associates to assist the minister and lead services when she was not there. I have been a WA since its beginning and was the facilitator for many years. We are now 9 strong and all are dedicated to presenting informative, sensitive and caring topics that align with our principles. We also are fortunate to have among our congregants many who have come forward to offer meaningful presentations. And we have been so very fortunate to have a number of guest ministers who have graced us with their presence.

As with most churches, attendance at Sunday services has declined over the years. Under the guidance of Rev. Sue, it was decided in 2012 that she would serve both SUUC and UUCSB in a half time position at each church, thus serving the needs of each church, and still maintaining a full time position for Rev. Sue. It was indeed fortuitous that a Worship Associate group had been formed as they would be called to cover the Sundays that Rev. Sue was at UUCSB.

Forever enthusiastic and forever caring, we at the Sanford Unitarian Universalist Church will continue its legacy with great pride, humility, awareness, peace, and love.

Love our church, Love our congregation, Love what we stand for – Thank You SUUC for being such an integral part of my life!

A Little About Me

I am a Divine being dwelling amidst Divine creation through which Spirit is always present and moving. As a spiritual caregiver, I am a guide, companion, and witness with others as they (re)discover and express the Divine within themselves, and heal their connection to the Divine in all of Its forms (Spirit, Self, Other, Creation).

I am silence and stillness. I am a deep listener. I am a voice for those who cannot speak, for those who are prevented from speaking, for those who don't have words. I am a truth-teller and a depth-shifter. I am committed to affecting one life at a time through respectful, informed, compassionate, and humble dialogue. In my ministry, I am welcoming to all and respect that the differences among us make us stronger.

I am a chaplain who creates and maintains sacred space, a deep listening presence, and opportunity for prayer and healing ritual. I am also a poetic preacher and use my gifts of prophetic witness and imagination to educate, challenge, and inspire. I am a creative liturgist who composes ritual and worship using story, song, and silence to engender a shared experience and expression of the Divine Mystery that moves us all. And finally, I am a responsible and responsive member of the global community, ignited by the fire of our faith toward action that heals our broken world and co-creates a global culture of equity, justice, and freedom for all.

I was raised in the flowing, golden prairies and rolling hills of central North Dakota. My parents were elementary school teachers, and my younger sister and I had what most would call a happy, normal childhood – privileged and protected, cradled in the embrace of our large German-Russian family and the Catholic Church.

From a very early age, music was an essential part of my life, and given that Church was central to everything we did, it was only natural that the two became interwoven for me. I was fascinated by it all – the ritual, the music, the mystery, the awe. I was most especially interested in people's experiences of these things.

I joined the Jesuit Volunteer Corps after getting my BA in Psychology, and was sent to Tacoma, Washington, to work at Nativity House, a day shelter for the homeless and marginalized. From the moment I walked in the doors, I knew it was where I was supposed to be. My eyes and heart were opened wide to the realities of our society and the struggles of our marginalized peoples. It was at Nativity House that I first began to really name and explore my call to ministry. I also began to explore the feminine divine, pagan spirituality, and discovered how to use art, journaling, meditation, and nature as ways to connect with Spirit.

My decision to come out as a lesbian at age 29 was a monumental shift in my image of self and how I moved through the world. I spent the next ten years discovering all it meant to be queer in today's world – and in *my* world, with my family and friends and co-workers. As I lived more and more into this truth, my spirituality began to emerge in a deeper and fuller way.

In 2010, Spirit led me to two congregations at the exact same time – a UU Fellowship and a Unity church. I became the administrator of one and the pianist of the other and fell in love with both. My call to ministry came booming out of the wilderness loud and clear, and both congregations encouraged and nurtured me toward seminary.

My mom is my biggest supporter and will always hold a strong sense of home for me in the middle of North Dakota. I am deeply committed to my beloved partner, Diana, who is also a UU minister, and her 15 year old son, Aidan.

I am a musician and composer, love animals and books, and am slowly improving my skills in both cooking and knitting.

Nature is an important source of renewal and inspiration, and I especially find comfort in trees, mountains, and the wind that sweeps across the prairie. I like to get out hiking and camping whenever I can - there's nothing better than a book and a hammock, gently swinging in the trees.
