# Shay's Sharing...

I hate politics. I always have. I'll spend hours talking to you about almost anything except the latest candidates or legislative bills or judicial rulings. Partly, this stems from the fact that I have always been diametrically opposed to the political opinions of the rest of my family – actually, to most of the rest of the population of my state (growing up in North Dakota).

However, this aversion to all things "political" does not serve me well as a minister in a faith that, by its very principles, urges me to call attention to oppression, demand

change, and hold leaders and institutions accountable for their actions and policies.

And so, as Election Day approaches, I keep thinking about the charge to action I gave to you in my sermon on October 14<sup>th</sup>.

"We need to do more than voice support. We need to show up and keep showing up."

Whenever I want to turn off the news and bury my head in the sand, I must keep reminding myself to show up – and I must figure out how that works for me. You will figure out how it works for you and together we will move our way through these times as a united front, knowing that together we stand.

And when I say, "I hate politics." I have to remind myself that what I am being called to do is not political – it is theological.

One of the roles of a minister is to be "prophetic"--which means not to predict the future, but to speak the truth even when it is difficult or dangerous. The truth is that there are horrible things happening in our nation and elsewhere, and that many of them are endorsed or directly caused by the current administration.

John Pavlovitz recently created a Facebook meme that says, "People say that I'm anti-Trump. That isn't the real story. I'm pro-humanity. I'm pro-diversity. I'm pro-decency. I'm pro-equality. I'm pro-compassion. I'm pro-justice. That this almost always leaves me in direct opposition to this president is simply a sad by-product."

Our first principle states that we affirm the inherent worth and dignity of all beings. This is not a political statement. It is one of the foundational theological statements of our Unitarian Universalist faith.

Showing up in support of refugees, immigrants, our trans siblings, and women is not political--it is a living out of our theology. We must show up in our pulpits, on the streets, in letters to the editor, in our families and workplaces, on social media, wherever we can use our voices and bodies to resist the oppression of any human being.

We must show up – and that includes me, because this isn't politics. This is Truth. For some, this is Life or Death. Ultimately, this is Love and I want to be there, walking hand in hand with you, standing strong in the face of hatred and fear. Let's show up together, my friends.

## **Thoughts From the President**

With our church building Centennial celebration this Sunday, and Fundraising plans in full swing, Sanford UU Church is energized! The Board has been kept abreast of the new Covenant of Right Relations Committee, members of which will manifest UUA suggestions of how we will treat one another, and I'm pleased that Shay speaks of this each Sunday she is with us. At the "Love Beyond Belief" workshop, which Karen, Al (President of UUCSB), and I attended with Shay at Portland First Parish last Saturday, the facilitator, Thandeka, lovingly compelled the approximately forty participants to explore our cognitive biases in a participatory way I'd never experienced. Through personal examples, skits, singing together, and visuals from "Smarter Every Day" and the movie "About Schmidt", we dug deep to reveal our own tendencies to talk at others, rather than just pausing to be with them. Thandeka claims that our experiences with what is beyond our limited senses, with the joyful and the awesome, are what differentiate our UU faith from other belief systems, and must be lived in each encounter with our fellow humans.

Even with the sad news from Pittsburgh this week, and the lack of compassionate leadership in our country, love can still prevail. I came across this poem by Edwin Arlington Robinson that seems to echo my feelings, though it was written at the turn of the 20th Century:

"If there be nothing, good or bad, but chaos for a soul to trust--

God counts it for a soul gone mad, and if God be God, He is just.

And if God be God, He is Love; and though the dawn be still so dim,

It shows us we have played enough with creeds that make a fiend of Him.

There is one creed, and only one, that glorifies God's excellence;

So cherish, that His will be done, the common creed of common sense.

It is the crimson, not the gray, that charms the twilight of all time;

It is the promise of the day that makes the starry sky sublime;

It is the faith within the fear that holds us to the life we curse –

So let us in ourselves revere the self which is the Universe!

Let us, the Children of the Night, put off the cloak which hides the scar!

Let us be Children of the Light, and tell the ages what we are!"

# Thanks, Ginny

When you want an easy hike to look at foliage, visit Mt. Washington and the Mousam River Valley, you can take the trail from Fox Farm Hill Road up Bauneg Beg Mountain. Near the top, the trail splits. You can go right and climb over and through the rocks of Devil's Den or you can go left up a gentler trail called "Ginny's Way" named after SUUC's own Ginny Reusch.

Ginny and Don Reusch retired to Maine about 25 years ago. To be near family, they built a home on Estes Hill Road, a gravel stretch out in the back end of North Berwick. Right away, they joined SUUC and the Great Works Regional Land Trust. Before coming to Maine, Don had practiced family medicine and Ginny had led the way in land preservation in Easton, Massachusetts.

An article in the Fall 2018 newsletter of the Great Works Regional Land Trust recorded a recent event on the mountain. It read: "A few family and friends held an impromptu gathering in the parking lot of Bauneg Beg Mountain Conservation Area. It was a warm August morning and we were there to show Ginny Reusch the recently installed plaque honoring her years of devotion to land conservation. # **Recycling and Composting Update**

### Recycling

To avoid contamination, Eco Maine is asking recyclers to be sure only eligible items are put into the recycling bins.

### **PLEASE:**

NO- tissue, paper towels, tissue paper – these item are at the end of their recycled life.

NO Styrofoam even though it has a number on it.

NO plastic bags or other plastic film – take to Hannaford, Shaw's, Lowe's, etc.

YES to ½ and ½ and other milk containers. Yes to paper, cardboard, paperboard, foil, magazines, glass jars, aseptic drink boxes, junk mail, cans including empty aerosol cans.

YES to rigid plastic numbered 1-7, except Styrofoam. For an interesting read check out this website to see what each plastic contains and how it is recycled.

There is a counter top compost container in the upstairs kitchen. It can be used for all fruit and veggie scraps and coffee grounds and filters, stale bread, crackers or chips.
